2019 has been another year where we have much to be thankful for as we seek to 'partner with God in the flourishing of our communities' and this report is a celebration of all that God has been doing in our midst.

Prayer has to be the foundation of all that we do as we acknowledge that this is God's work and not ours and that without him we can do nothing. At the APCM last year we identified specific areas in both churches that we felt called to pray for in 2019: an increased presence and encounter with God in our worship; a greater sense of unity between our congregations and between the churches of our town; our young people to grow and flourish particularly in their schools; and for our communities and individual lives to be transformed. As we reflect on the past year it is so encouraging to see the different ways in which God has answered these prayers 'more than we could ever ask or imagine' (Ephesians 3:20).

During the last year it has been exciting to see how God has released individuals into new ministries and to see them flourishing. Malvern Christians Against Poverty (CAP) has now been thoroughly established across our town with some great stories of what God is doing already. The Bereavement Coffee Mornings have been such a place of blessing to so many who are bereaved and the Home for Good group has been inspirational and a valuable support to our many families who are involved with fostering and adoption. During the last year the youth and children's ministries too have flourished and it has been amazing to see how God has been calling our young people to step up into ministry, especially with Youth Alpha at the Chase and the Octagon Youth Club.

I am so thankful to every single person who has been part of what God is doing here over the last year – for those serving faithfully each week, those praying, giving, encouraging and caring for each other. God continues to bring many new people to us – some who are exploring faith and some who have been Christians for many years who are finding a new home with us and being released into new ministry.

There have been challenges and times of sadness along the way this year too, and we particularly have lost some very special congregation members, including Jeremy Attree and Andrea Faraday over the last 12 months. This leads me finally to say how grateful I am personally for all the love and support that I receive from all of you, who encourage me and support me and the family so faithfully. I feel truly blessed to be called to such amazing, humble, servant hearted and caring churches and I look forward to all that God will do in this coming year.

Overview of Services

ST ANDREW'S SERVICES

The 9am congregation has continued to flourish in the last year. It has been lovely to see an increasing number of 10:45 regulars joining us on occasions and we now regularly have 30 attending and at times have hit 40 too! We are continuing to experiment a little with the service, exploring how it can keep its traditional feel, but still have a variety of approaches to worship to help us all engage with God more deeply, and we hope to explore this further in 2020 by the setting up of a 9am leadership team.

The 10:45 has continued to see many new members welcomed by our enthusiastic welcome team and we've had some special times over the last year. Some of the highlights have been the Home for Good Sunday where many shared their testimonies of fostering and adoption, some great baptism services including full immersion baptisms of Eleanor, Emma, Maria and Marcus, some interesting and varied seminars at Seminar Sunday and a very special All Age service in the autumn led by our youth. We continue to be really grateful for all those who help out so faithfully from the tech team, the musicians, the leaders and preachers, and coffee makers. Thank you for all you do! We continue to be nearly full to capacity at this service and are once again in discussions about how we can resolve this lovely problem. In 2020 we are also setting up a 10:45 consultation to review a few different aspects of the service to help us do things even better in the future.

ALL SAINTS SERVICES

Our hope is that everyone who attends our Sunday Services will encounter Jesus and deepen their faith. The 8.45am is a more traditional liturgical format with hymns led by the organ. The 10.30am service is a more informal and contemporary form of worship. Both services continue to be well supported by a regular congregation. Once a month, both congregations come together for a 9.30am service to ensure togetherness as a church community. During this last year we introduced the 'Second Sunday Special' café style service once a month. This is an informal service giving people an opportunity to discuss issues of faith in groups around a table rather than have a sermon. This has given people a chance to explore faith and learn from one another in a relaxed way. Over the year we've been teaching into 'Who is the Holy Spirit?' and 'Living as Strangers in a secular world' based on 1 Peter. One of the great highlights of the year



was baptising Shaun Barry from Abbey House. He was such a blessing to us in the 3 years that he was with us and we were so sad to see him move away when Abbey House closed down over Christmas.



DEEPER

Our team-wide monthly service, DEEPER, continues to be a special place of encounter with God. It is a place for extended worship, teaching and ministry and it is lovely to see people increasingly comfortable praying and ministering to each other. This year it has been great to have some of the youth join us for our services and this has been such an encouragement to be worshipping and learning together with them. In October, Gary Gibbs from Regents College also came and led a very useful evening on how to share our faith. In 2020 we are beginning to seek God as to whether He is calling us to create a weekly evening service and a new congregation, which DEEPER will be part of on the first Sunday of the month still.



PRAYER

As a worshipping community we believe prayer underpins everything we do and is foundational as we aspire to hear and understand how God is leading us to serve our community and one another. In addition, we share the needs of the church via a prayer chain which allows people to request prayer and share testimony of what God is doing. For the first time this year the churches

Each of the nine days were then hosted by a different church with the aim of praying blessing and flourishing on our town. Most groups meet in people's homes and a few meet on church premises.

Groups provide pastoral care and encourage members to provide mutual support to one another. Leaders also encourage members in their outreach to friends, family, colleagues or the wider community.

LADIES MINISTRIES / RETREAT







ST ANDREW'S MISSION PARTNERS

This year the PCC has acknowledged our financial blessing by increasing our away giving beyond our committed 10%, something we hope to continue in future years. We have taken on several new mission partners, whilst continuing with our established links. We were delighted to have Josiah Venture leaders Terry and Hana English with their family at our 'Weekend at Home' in October; they head-up an evangelistic choirs outreach to young people in the Czech republic. Support for Open Doors, working with believers in countries where Christians are persecuted, has been spearheaded by the Friday morning lifegroup but has also caught the imagination of our young people, one of whom, Kay Baxter, raised about £3,000 in sponsorship. FAIRTRADE

At the end of 2018 the outlook for Traidcraft was bleak. The company in Gateshead had to close with the loss of many jobs in the UK and an end to the trading partnership with many producer groups in the developing world. The good news is that the new, smaller scale company that took over at the beginning of 2019 has performed well. It has been able to pay back a large loan from a benefactor and, with good sales in the Autumn, Traidcraft is surviving. To quote one of the new managers, Matt, '2019 may have been about recovery, but 2020 will all be about setting the course for a bright new future.'

Sales at the monthly stall at St Andrew's for 2019 have been £1225.31 in total. Thank you to all those who have supported the stall. By buying from Traidcraft you are showing your commitment to making trade fairer and enabling families in Asia, Africa and South America to buy food, education and health care for their families. May I challenge all those who do not buy from the stall to consider doing so. Just a regular box of tea, bag of coffee etc. will help Traidcraft stay in business and bring that ' bright new future' to the company and all those it supports. Currently, we have had to stop

buying from many of our producer groups. If sales increase, we will be in a more secure position to trade with these and other groups in the future.

At All Saints, thanks to everyone who has bought biscuits, chocolate (a lot!) and honey from the monthly Fairtrade table. All sales go to help Traidcraft continue their valuable and important work in ensuring people overseas get fair payment for their work.


SHOEBOX PACKING PARTY AT ALL SAINTS




FRONTLINES

DEANERY AND DIOCESAN SYNODS

Malvern Deanery Synod had a talk from the Rural Mission Enabler – Gary Crellin, Vicar of Powick, noting that with rural parishes often grouped together, it can be difficult to recruit clergy. Rural parishes may include farms, retired communities, new housing estates and industry, as well as the village, perhaps more of a 'dormitory' with people at work and school elsewhere. Recently we have looked at how we make people feel welcome to services.

The Diocesan Synod has run 'Open Conversations' across the country about finances and organisational changes. Over 1000 have attended with a high number appearing to agree with the comment "Adapt, or die" in relation to the Anglican Church. The Diocese has made some staff redundant, and Parish Share discussions continue. Online Forums may be instigated to allow for exchange of local initiatives, to avoid 're-inventing the wheel'.

Deanery meetings offer the chance to be part of the local, wider Church in Malvern and help support local mission initiatives. Do come and join us!

CHURCHES TOGETHER MALVERN

Lifepath, CAP, Malvern Welcomes and Food Bank continue their ministries, and this year has brought heightened concern about homelessness. We have been represented on Malvern Cares, a group of Malvern charities, residents and councillors who have been working with the Worcester Maggs Centre to fund a drop-in Centre for homeless people in Malvern, which opened February 2020.

The notable new act of united witness last summer was the 'Thy Kingdom Come' Prayer Tent in the grounds of the Priory, from Ascension to Pentecost.
