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RECTOR'S REVIEW

Little did we know at the start of 2020 just what this year would hold. Early in January we sensed God giving us a verse for the year from Isaiah 54:2-3

'Enlarge the place of your tent, stretch your tent curtains wide Do not hold back; lengthen your cords, strengthen your stakes For you will spread out to the right and to the left.'

As we prayed through these verses, we sensed God saying, 'if you drive the tent pegs deep and go deeper with me, I will stretch you to the left and to the right.' It was only when the COVID-19 pandemic fully drove us into lockdown that we began to see what this might all mean. From mid-March we began broadcasting our services online, as our church buildings had to close, and through this God graciously opened up a wonderful opportunity to reach people through our online services, ZOOM Alpha and Christmas activities who we would never have otherwise had the chance to reach. In the midst of real trials and difficulties God has brought significant fruit. We are so grateful to everyone who has worked so hard to allow us to continue 'being the church' in this strange season, but we especially have to mention Derek at St Andrew's and Andy Green at All Saints who have made the technology happen so amazingly behind the scenes!

In many ways God seemed to have already been preparing us for what was ahead. In Autumn 2019 we had preached a sermon series on 1 Peter and reflected on what it meant to be the scattered church and also had recently set up the 'blessings fund' which has enabled us to bless not only members of our congregations who have been hit by hard times, but also others in our community who we have been able to bless through it.

Although many of our key ministries sadly have had to shut down or significantly be restricted over much of this year, God has opened up some new opportunities too, not least the Early Bird Service which has been a real blessing to our young families, and also new ministries working in partnership with the Octagon including the Community Pantry and other initiatives to serve that area of our parishes. As we go forward now, and at some point emerge into the 'new normal,' we will need to discern prayerfully what God is asking us to let go of, adapt and continue into this new season that he is bringing us into.

Amidst the joys there has been sadness too. Over the last year we have lost some of our precious congregation members, not least Megan Oliver who, at 104½, continued to be a faithful and prayerful servant to the very end and whose legacy will long live on at All Saints. In October we were devastated by the tragedy involving the Powell family and we continue to walk with Kevin and Sue and hold them in our prayers.

There are many challenges ahead for the coming year as we discern where God is leading us as what the 'new normal' looks like, but we trust that our God who has been faithful and walked with us in 2020 will continue to provide for us and lead us on.

Overview of Services



ST ANDREW'S SERVICES

St Andrew's had normal services until March 15th when we first went into lockdown and then moved fully online on Mothering Sunday broadcasting, jointly with All Saints, a contemporary and traditional service each week from our homes. Whilst this has been a huge challenge, it has been lovely to see great creativity released through these services and lots of different people taking part through readings, prayers and in particular testimonies.

We also started a midweek service (which we had been planning to start in the Spring anyway) on a Thursday lunchtime which has had more of a traditional, reflective feel and we hope that this is something that can continue into the 'new normal' in 2021.

LIFE GROUPS

PASTORAL MINISTRY



ST ANDREW'S & ALL SAINTS ONLINE & YOUTUBE CHANNEL

For most of 2020 we were unable to hold services 'in-person' or had severe attendance limitations in order to maintain social distancing rules. In March we therefore quickly moved to having two recorded hour long online services each week; a contemporary service and a traditional service (often including Holy Communion). These were recorded at home or in church (when allowed), edited together with relevant hymns / songs and produced as YouTube videos, also available via our website. Weekly DVDs are also produced for those without internet access.

During the year we also introduced our own YouTube channel www.youtube.com/c/StAndrewsandAllSaints via which all services and videos are available and watched around the world.



Later in the year, All Saints also started live streaming an additional service each week and various additional videos were produced for Advent, the Nativity Trail and Christmas. Thank you to all those who have helped make this possible during the year.

EARLY BIRD SERVICE

We began our Early Bird service in September, inviting families with young children to join us in the hall at St Andrew's on Sunday mornings at 9am. Around seven families came with a picnic blanket, which



was their socially distanced space to stay in and we provided all they needed for the service. When lockdown began in November we moved to doing Early Birds on Zoom and this has been working well with around ten families joining us each week. We always begin with our 'Jumping for God' song, followed by a story and craft activities, a thought for the day for the grown-ups, another song, a prayer activity and we always end by saying the grace together. Early Birds has been great fun and it's lovely to see the children close up to the screens sharing their news and showing us what they have made!

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY GROUPS AND ONLINE ACTIVITIES

2020 has been a strange year for our children's Sunday groups; early in the year they ran as usual and then stopped suddenly when we went into the first lockdown. Since then, resource sheets have been posted on the website each week for families to look at together with ideas to read, watch, make, pray and do. In the summer a group of children's leaders began to produce videos for young families to watch together, with a Bible story, prayer and craft or activity ideas and this is posted on the website each week. In December we began a Zoom children's group on Sunday afternoons for the 7-11's and this has continued, now meeting each Sunday morning.

As we were unable to run a holiday club in the summer, we joined forces with Virtual Sunday School and provided resource kits for families who signed up with us to watch holiday club online. We ran a Light Party on Zoom on October 31st and had a good number of families join us, again we provided resource bags so that everyone could join in with the activities. We ended the year with a Zoom Christingle service, where families made their Christingles at home (bags of resources were delivered the day before) and seeing everyone light their Christingles, turn out their lights and sing 'Away in a manger' on 25 screens was a very special end to a most unusual year.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES

Let me first take a moment to thank both Andy Green & Lisa O'Kane who have stepped down within the last 12 months from incredible, faithful service to our young people. Thank you.

It has been an incredibly strange time and sadly, as is often the case, young people in particular have often had the roughest deal. The picture from churches across the country is grim too, with many youth ministries losing numbers or simply stopping completely. But we've actually seen growth in engagement in this period.

Perhaps the biggest reason for this is our wonderful Youth Mentors. Since April 2020 all young people across our churches have had access to group mentoring, on either a weekly/fortnightly basis. I estimate since April myself and 14 volunteers have given over 500hrs of time to our mentoring groups; and the fruit is evident. Thank you so much to all of you.

Alongside this our Sundays have continued throughout, whether online or in person. We've run prayer sessions, met 1:1 and produced daily readings and videos, delivered discipleship resources (like our advent candles & prayers), had nights of fun (the Youth & Families Christmas Zoom quiz was a particular highlight) and offered continual pastoral support.

In particular I would like to thank Hannah, Simon MacCaulay, Sophie Wharton, Ellie Quinlan and Simon Noble for their invaluable efforts as the 'youth team' and selflessly serving in-person on Sundays, alongside our great many other 'teams' with too many people to name. Please continue to pray for all our young people, their families, and those who volunteer. It is invaluable.

I am proud to say that when our young people needed us, our churches have stepped up — and we have been there for them.

Octagon Ministries during the Pandemic

Over the year we have worked together with the Brook Farm Community Association at the Octagon in many ways, starting with church volunteers helping to deliver emergency food parcels during the first lockdown to families who were struggling.

In the summer term we ran a project called 'Virtual Cook & Eat', giving a recipe and ingredients to young people (mostly from the youth group) encouraging them to cook meals from fresh ingredients and then share their experiences on Zoom with Sarah (Development Worker), Levi, George and myself.

In the summer holidays we launched 'Not School Lunch' cooking a hot meal for families who receive free school meals; a team of about 15 volunteers from both churches helped to cook and serve around 60 meals each week. This was repeated again in the October half term where we cooked on Tuesday and Thursday!



In September we launched the Community Pantry, offering food from FareShare and donations from Morrisons to families and local people. The pantry is open on Tuesday mornings and Thursday afternoons and is staffed by Sarah McCarten-Williams and volunteers from both churches, and it has been a real privilege to begin to build relationships with folk who come regularly to the pantry.

In October we launched 'Family Cook & Eat' where we provide a recipe and ingredients for a hot meal for eighteen families each week. This has been really successful in encouraging families to use more fresh ingredients, learn new skills and try new foods!

At Christmas we worked with the Rotary Club and Waitrose to make up 100 hampers filled with Christmas treats; with help from the Foodbank and the Sunshine Centre to distribute around 45 hampers of essentials and treats and then with Morrisons to make up 25 fresh hampers for families to enjoy a traditional Christmas dinner which they otherwise would not have been able to afford.




All Saints

DEANERY SYNOD

The year started with a widespread and well attended series of consultation meetings across the diocese, involving far more people than just Deanery Synod members. The aim was to recognise that the existing structure needed changing to make deaneries effective, mission-focussed entities. These consultations continued via Zoom during Lockdown.

Deanery Synods representatives are re-elected every 3 years, as happened at the delayed APCMs held in 2020. Consequently, the first Deanery Synod meeting following re-election was also delayed until November. Almost immediately after this, Bishop John issued orders enacting the results of the consultations. The 13 deaneries were reduced to 6, the Malvern Deanery ceased to exist on 31 Jan 2021 and became the Malvern and Upton Deanery and 'Rural Deans' became known as 'Area Deans'.

The number of church representatives elected to the Deanery Synod is determined by the size of the Electoral Roll for each church. The year ahead will be an exciting one with a new vision across the new deanery and it is important that the full quotas of representatives are elected. St Andrew's should have 3 representatives (it currently has 2 vacancies) and All Saints has its quota of 2.

We have found it really encouraging to listen to other churches' perspectives and also to be able to pray for them. Mutual fellowship and encouragement is so important. It is a privilege to represent our churches and we are aware of how well off we are compared with some of the other churches in the Deanery – not just in monetary terms but in our leadership, vision and commitment too.

Nigel Coke-Woods, the Methodist minister, organised the united Zoom service for Sunday 24th, which was joined by over 100 worshippers. Phillip Johnson, vicar of Malvern Link with Cowleigh, spoke on 'Abiding in Christ', the theme for the week.

CHURCH FABRIC: BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS, ALL SAINTS

The church building itself is in reasonable condition. The main issue is water damage where routine maintenance of gutters and downpipes needs to be scheduled rather than wait for problems to arise. Our Malvern stone walls, which don't look too clever in places, are in fact in good shape and will be repointed in Spring 2021.

This year we have had 2 new organ pipes added to our special organ which will allow an even greater repertoire to be played on it for all to enjoy.

Special thanks must go to Angela Davison for the fantastic work she and her small group of volunteers have done in the grounds of the church this year. Once tamed, the 'jungle' needs to be kept under control and we may need to consider paying someone to do it.



SAFEGUARDING

The PCCs of All Saints and St Andrew's have complied with their duty to have 'due regard' to the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guidance.



During 2020, the Safeguarding Committee, which

represents both churches, has implemented the new increased requirements for church members to complete safeguarding training at different levels, with many more church roles now requiring training, 24 members of the churches have completed DBS checks. 41 members have completed safeguarding training at various levels.

A few safeguarding concerns have arisen during the year and these have been addressed promptly by Dave Bruce and myself. Support and advice have been sought from the Diocese on every occasion.

The Safeguarding Committee has met twice. The advice booklet for those working with vulnerable adults is complete and the booklets for those working with children or younger people are nearly ready. A policy for the 'Use of Social Media with Children and Vulnerable Adults' has been approved by the PCCs and is being implemented.

TREASURERS' REPORTS

All Saints' Treasurer's Report for 2020

We began the year with a forecast deficit of just over £5,000 but we ended the year with a £5,000 surplus!! So, what caused this swing? One obvious cause is the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. With church operations being much reduced, our expenditure was nearly £7,500 less that we were expecting. Conversely, our income was some £3,000 more than forecast.

Although plate collections are down as you might expect, we are very fortunate in that our other income has not changed. The increase in our income arose from a one-off windfall in the Gift Aid tax claim. This is a quirk of us joining the Parish Giving Scheme effectively giving us an extra claim in the year. It won't happen again!!

Going forward, there is some uncertainty about the future Parish Share for All Saints and St Andrew's and this could impact on our commitments to ministry in the team. However, we have strong reserves and this puts us in a good position to plan with some confidence and be able to ride out any temporary bumps in the transition period.

St Andrew's Treasurer's Report for 2020

During the year 2020 the church received voluntary (undesignated or restricted) gifts of just under £140,000 (an 12.5% decrease on 2019) on which it was able to reclaim a vitally important £31,000 of Gift Aid. Once other income is included (for example, income from lettings of the Church Centre) we received a total income of just over £240,000 (a 5% decrease overall on 2019).

This included just over £22,000 being gifted into the **Blessing Fund** we set up at the end of 2019 (almost as if God knew what was coming in 2020!) and more than £13,000 restricted gifts (i.e. gifts that can only be spent for a specific purpose) towards the costs of running CAP Malvern. Our income was also boosted this year by £10,000 of government grants to support us in lockdown periods for which we are most grateful – in large part offsetting the loss on our hall income that it was paid to help address.

Of this income we spent just over £220,000 on church activities (effectively the same as we spent in 2019). This also included payment of just over £81,000 as Parish Share to support clergy costs and the wider Diocese's work (representing 100% of the requested sums).

Overall, this means the total net funds belonging to the church grew over the year by just under £11,000 to a total of just under £136,000 (including restricted funds, such as for CAP Malvern, and designated funds, such as the Blessing fund, that together make up approximately half of these sums).

On behalf of the PCC, I very much want to express my thanks for your very significant giving to God's work at St Andrew's Church this year — a year unlike one most of us have ever experienced in so many ways and one where we are very aware many people's incomes have been under significant pressure. We plan during the next year to be open to developing and refining the range of activities we undertake. Therefore, your continued support will be applied to deliver more of what we believe God is calling us to partner with him to do in the parish, in Malvern, across the UK and internationally.

I also wish to offer thanks to the other members of the Finance team who support the smooth running of the church's finances - Valerie Jamieson (planned giving and gift aid), Chris Hopes (cash management) and in particular to Marion Robbins (bookkeeper). Between the three of them the bulk of the finance work is done. I get the easy bits!
