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## Rector's Review

2023 has been a very different year for me as, after seven years in post, I had the gift of taking my first sabbatical between April and July. The highlight was spending two and a half weeks travelling around Scotland in a campervan, particularly exploring Celtic Christianity and the Hebridean Revival as well as enjoying the stunning mountains and coastlines. There were so many things that impacted me, but several



months on, two things in particular stick in my mind. The first is the simplicity of the churches of Lewis where the Hebridean Revival took place. There were no programmes, no mission strategies and few committees. Instead, it was just a very ordinary 'community in prayer' committed to encountering Jesus in the

Scriptures and in worship. Into that community the power of God came in a remarkable way and brought incredible transformation to a community. I wonder whether we have lessons to learn about not over complicating things and 'Simply Pursuing Jesus' and letting God do the rest?

Secondly, I was particularly struck by how it was in the wild places – the beaches and in the mountains – that I particularly encountered Jesus, not in the great 'religious buildings'. Since I have returned to 'normal life' again I have tried to continue to live this out by taking time to walk on the hills each day and encounter Jesus there and continue to reflect on how we can find Jesus much more outside of our church buildings and continue to 'walk with him' in the whole of life.

Taking time away to recharge, reflect and live in new rhythms for a time was so life giving for me, and a reminder to all of us that we all need to have 'Sabbath seasons' where God calls us to rest and take time out to be reshaped and reinvigorated again. As I found out, the church of God and the mission of God goes on very well without us and so none of us are indispensable!

I am very grateful to everyone who has served so faithfully, particularly in my absence both in the summer and in my recent time off sick in the autumn. The church continues to strengthen, grow and bear much fruit and I am so grateful for the privilege of serving in such amazing communities. This review celebrates the many

contributions that so many people have made to ‘partnering with God in the flourishing of our communities’ and we celebrate once more all that God has done.

As we enter 2024 it has been so exciting to ‘re-form’ the Chase Team, employ a new Youth Ministry Leader and begin to prepare the Parish Profile for a new ‘Vicar in the Chase Team’. There is so much to look forward to and we continue to prayerfully seek God every step of the way. The words of Isaiah 43:18-19 seem so apt in this season:

“Forget the former things;  
do not dwell on the past.  
See, I am doing a new thing!  
Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?  
I am making a way in the wilderness  
and streams in the wasteland.”

## Early Birds at St Andrew's

Early Birds is an informal, friendly service at St Andrew's for families with young children, who arrive with great excitement and enthusiasm each week. Families sit together on mats and enjoy songs, stories, crafts, prayers and a 'message' for the grownups, as we seek to learn more about God's love for us and help our families, both adults and children, to grow in faith. It has been a real highlight this year to see the children enthusiastically volunteering to help act out the stories – and a challenge to ensure there are roles for all who want to take part! It has been exciting to see friendships developing as we share together and enjoy coffee and biscuits after saying the grace. We have been encouraged to see families growing in faith, some moving on to 'big church' and some bringing their children to be baptised!

## 10.30 Contemporary Service at St Andrew's

We began 2023 by conducting a 'Service Review' when a range of people were invited to consider and comment on **Welcome, Worship and the Word**. The 10.30 Team then collated the response forms and identified some ways things might be improved. These have included gathering for prayer every week at 10am, reorganizing the foyer and relocating the Welcome Team. In services there has been greater emphasis on stories/testimonies; recognizing the diversity of learning styles and the importance of application to contemporary life; having a specific Frontline Focus twice a month and creating space for silent reflection and response. We are now developing Prayer Ministry as an integral part of our regular worship; streamlining the system for serving coffee after the service.



Our numbers are now higher than pre-pandemic levels at this service with an average attendance on a 'normal' Sunday of 36 children and 100 adults. This is especially encouraging because in 2019, Chaos (14-18's) took place during the 10.30 service and there was no Early Birds or regular evening service.

We continue to give thanks for the blessings of the God who is leading us into LIFE!

## The Six at St Andrew's

The Six at St Andrew's offers an informal, interactive service of worship that is summed up in three words: Worship, Word and Wonder. Meeting in the evening gives us the opportunity for extended times of sung worship, a longer teaching slot, and the space to wonder at all that God is doing amongst us – including

shared testimony and prayer ministry. There is more time to listen to the Holy Spirit.

Here are some comments from those who come: 'What I like about The Six service is that it is slightly less structured, potentially giving a little bit more space for more reflective stuff to happen.' ... 'We don't try to cram too much in.' ... 'I prefer having a longer worship set.'

We begin with refreshments at 5.45pm, but before that, from 5pm, there is time to pray and listen to the Lord for the service. This session is open to all.

We are committed to learning how to be disciples of Jesus in God's world today. So as well as largely following the same preaching series as other services, we took part in a recorded course on 'Prophetic Lifestyle' which gave us a deeper understanding of how we can be more receptive to the voice of God in our daily lives.

In the past year, there have been special occasions, including the baptisms of three young people, and a strawberry social during the summer. We have also been on the move, joining with All Saints for two services of 'Deeper', and attending several services of 'The Six on Tour' at All Saints Worcester in joint celebrations with other local churches.

Several families have either come through our Early Birds service, or now attend it, and Helen and Ruth now conduct all the baptism preparation with these families. We have also had two very joyful 'full immersion baptism' services at our Six service, where we have seen three of our older children/younger youth Flo, Sky and Taylor get baptised and share their amazing testimonies so confidently.

## Easter 2023

Easter was a very special time with some meaningful services and daily video reflections to help us journey together through Holy Week.

To seek to engage the community with the events of the Easter story, we created the Great Malvern Easter Treasure Hunt using a web-based app to guide people round different locations in Malvern to watch videos and answer questions about the Easter story. The treasure hunt took people to the top of British Camp to reflect on the cross and ended up at Giant's Cave to tell the story of the resurrection. This proved to be a great hit, with over 100 families and individuals registering for the Treasure Hunt.

### **Life Groups**

Life groups have continued to thrive in 2023. Two new groups have been formed, following the Lent courses last March. There are 18 groups meeting at various times during the week. Some meet during the day, including one early morning men's group. Other meet on weekday evenings. Several groups are ladies' groups. The online group has continued to meet on Zoom, for those who do not want to meet in person. Approximately 180 people are members of a Life Group.

Life Groups mirror the whole church vision to foster our relationship with God, our relationships with one another and our outreach to families, colleagues and the community. The emphasis differs between groups. Groups provide pastoral support for their members, not just from the leader but also by encouraging mutual support for one another.

### **Pastoral Ministry**

## Youth Ministry

This year our youth work has largely been volunteer led with the support of our Operations Manager Liz who became our acting Youth Ministry Leader committing up to 12 hours a week of her time. We continued to run two groups each Sunday, Pathfinders and CHAOS. **Pathfinders (11-14)** meeting during our 10:30am St Andrew's service and had between 10 and 20 young people attending each week, several of whose families joined the church in the last year. **CHAOS (14-19)** meeting in the church hall during the St Andrew's 6pm service. We had between 10 and 18 young people attending each week, some from St Andrew's families, some from families attending other churches in our town, and a few visitors from the boarding schools in the town.

In March 2023 we took our older youth away for the weekend to a local Christian activity centre, where we had a lot of fun getting to know each other better, taking part in adventure activities and Christian teaching and worship sessions. We also ran a one-day taster version in the summer for our younger youth.

Each half term we have encouraged our youth to attend 'Unite' a youth worship evening in Worcester which sees over 100 young people coming together from 10 churches in the area. It has been really exciting to see how God is moving through these events.



A new Youth Ministry Leader has been appointed and Nathan will start in April.

It is a very exciting time for someone new to come in and lead the team, to develop this ministry, champion our youth, and take us forward in this new season. He will inherit an amazing group of young people and leaders to nurture and grow, and be able to bring new ideas and vision to build on the strong foundations and opportunities that have gone before.

## Schools

Our interaction with the three schools (Malvern Wells, Wyche and Malvern Parish) has increased greatly over the year. Alongside Easter, Leavers, Harvest and Christmas services in All Saints, we have taken 'Experience Easter' and 'Exploring the Lord's Prayer' to all three schools. The team has delivered lessons about Pentecost and 'What Christmas means to Christians', helped with Open the Book, led assemblies, helped at Summer and Christmas Fairs and been interviewed by SIAMS! It has been great to get to know the staff a little better and for the children to recognise us and know that we are part of the church, alongside being able to share our faith and help them to discover a little more of God's love for them.



We have enjoyed another very successful year, taking '**Open the Book**' into four schools once a fortnight. We performed our Christmas puppet show in six schools and enjoyed the challenge of a new script. The Bible Society has rewritten the Open the Book material and each team must use this by September 2024. ## Christians Against Poverty (CAP)



We are celebrating with 10 families going debt-free in the last year! But the real celebration is people being more equipped to live on tight budgets. CAP Debt service, Money Coaching and Life Skills all play a part. But the stark reality of poverty, mixed in with traumas, job loss, relationship breakdown, addiction and rising living costs, is crippling many. Over the last year, we supported 40 households; families, couples, and singles, aged 20-80. With our volunteer befrienders, blessing team, and your prayers, we help clients facing up to debt, encourage and build hope. Some clients, once they have their budget and options, are equipped to manage their debt independently, but many clients need CAP's support until they are debt-free. T is one of these clients:

A year ago, T was weighed down with fear and anxiety, bills increasing, and demand letters built up. She said, 'I just prioritise feeding and keeping the children safe and warm'. CAP gave her clarity, understanding and courage to move forward. But there was more, one of her three children was not going to school because of severe anxiety attacks. Her befriender, a former teacher, offered to do some home tutoring, which built her daughter's confidence to go back to school. T has started a faith journey and growing in confidence and she went debt-free this January! This is just one of our remarkable stories. Please pray for God's wisdom, energy and guidance in growing our support and volunteers.

## Octagon Ministries:

At the Coffee Shop we are still trying to grow the numbers attending but those who come are loyal supporters and we have a fantastic team who bake, serve drinks and walk alongside our guests in a variety of ways. Highlights in 2023 have included services at Easter, Harvest and Christmas which were well attended plus special meals to mark these festivals.

Thursday Project continues to meet after school with around seven regular families and a few more dipping in occasionally. These are happy sessions where we encourage the families to do crafts, play board games, have a meal together and use the community pantry.

A new craft group for the mums began in December, meeting twice a month, which grew out of our summer play dates in the park and discovering that there was a longing for a community where they could discover new skills – like knitting, sewing and making Christmas wreaths! One of the Thursday Project mums now volunteers to help run this group with Helen.

Volunteers from our churches support the pantry and café which now runs on a Friday morning, around 30-40 families use the pantry each week with food coming from FareShare and Morrisons.



Volunteers also support the Octagon Youth Group which meets on a Monday evening, helping to run the activities and cooking a meal for the young people.

A small group have faithfully met at the Octagon on Sunday afternoons twice a month to pray for the activities, the families and people we meet each week, the teams of staff and volunteers and the local community. It has been exciting to see prayers answered and to look forward to what God might be planning in the future!

## Joint World Mission & Social Justice Group

The joint Mission Committee has responsibility for selecting, promoting, communicating and encouraging our 12 mission partners around the world. We also have responsibility to promote and support short term missions from within our churches. Currently we are bringing prayer points for individual partners each month to one of the services and looking to have one or two 'live' mission services each year. We believe it is vital for us to not only tithe our income but to ensure that we have an outward looking vision, for God's Kingdom is worldwide.

### All Saints Mission Giving 2023

As in previous years, we aimed to give away at least 10% of last year's unrestricted income, which amounted to £7,500. We actually gave away £7,700 which was spilt between beneficiaries at home and abroad as follows:

## **Church Fabric: Buildings and Grounds, All Saints**

In 2023, work continued to address the issues flagged up by the last quinquennial inspection, none of which were major. All works requiring completion within 12 months have been done and attention has turned to the less urgent tasks. There were no unforeseen fabric issues with which to contend.

In the grounds, two trees were felled and branches from others removed. Volunteers fitted a fence along the top of the bank by the Store and tree chippings made a path alongside. This would enable us to make the area next to the crypt more accessible and useful for outdoor events.

## Church Fabric: Buildings and Technical, St Andrew's

During 2023 a lot was achieved including:

- Continued improvements to our IT infrastructure, including a new office PC, further roll out of Microsoft 365, supporting CAP Malvern and our website.
- Continued maintenance (including locks, plumbing, blocked drains, replacement of bulbs, front doors, boilers, laptops, etc.).
- Installing a new screen in the Foyer.
- Replacing the heat exchanger in the boiler in the new build.
- Grounds clearance and maintenance, repairs to gutters, roofs, car park, etc.

At the end of 2023 we received our delayed Quinquennial Inspection Report. This included comments like 'This very well used church is very well kept, with maintenance being carried out promptly when needed, and little and often as required to keep on top of repairs and maintenance. The parish should be congratulated for this.' The report identified a few items for action which we were aware of, but also noted the need in the coming years for re-pointing parts of the outside of the church. We are also exploring ways that we could move towards Net-Zero. Following on, we have drawn up an ambitious action plan for 2024.

Having three regular weekly services each requiring two technical people (sound and laptop) increasing to three for recorded services (Sunday mornings) has created a real challenge at times in having enough trained technical people available to fill the rota. We have been able to recruit some additional people and train them up – but we could do with some more volunteers.

We thank God for his provision and guidance in all that we have done this year and we continue to have Him at the centre of all we discuss and decide.

As Treasurer, Andy Lymer has ably steered us through the management of finances. However, we have continued to be without a PCC Secretary and Val Fane and Liz Saunders have done a sterling job at regularly taking the minutes of meetings.

Prayer continues to underpin our PCC meetings, and we thank God for His provision and guidance.

# Safeguarding

The PCC has complied with its duty to have 'due regard' to the House of Bishops' Safeguarding Policy and Practice Guidance.

The parishes are now generally compliant with all Church of England requirements. All required documents and procedures in place and good practice is being implemented.

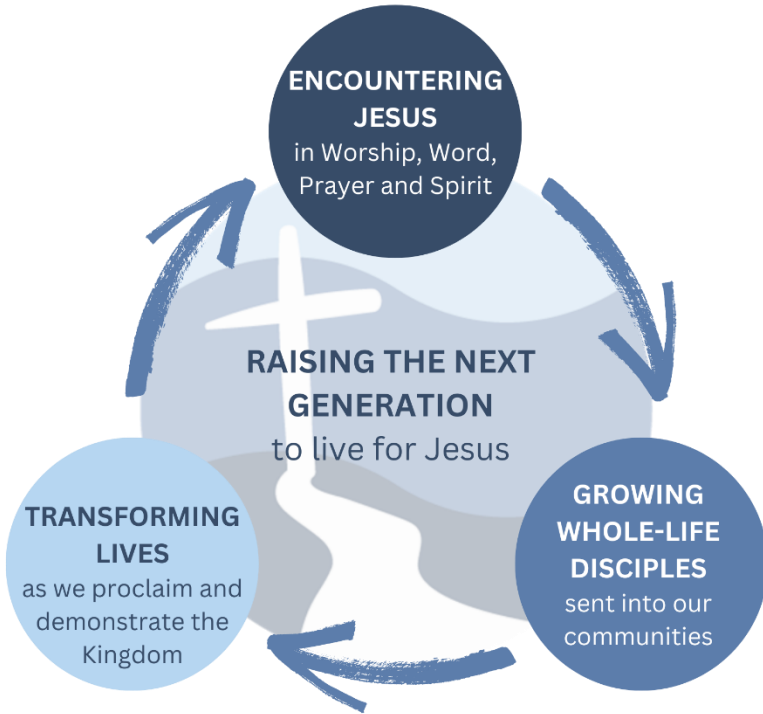
